Terroirs of the Barossa 'Eden Valley' Shiraz 2019

Heritage

Château Tanunda was established in 1890 and is the site of some of the first vines planted in the Barossa in the 1840s as well as the Valley's first winery. The Château is an Australian heritage icon whose grand buildings, magnificent gardens and prime vineyards are owned by the Geber family. In the Barossa, the family continue their own tradition of fine winemaking which spans over three centuries.

Vinevard

The Terroirs of the Barossa looks to highlight the unique wine flavor characteristics within the individual subregions, or 'Parishes' in the Barossa. These differences stem from the relationships between man and place, with soils, climate zones, viticulture, aspects and water access, all playing important roles in the flavor of the grapes of these sites.

We have chosen Eden Valley to highlight its rich, darker flavours unique to this high altitude, cooler climate and rocky, clay loam soils.

Soil: red-grey loams with slate and granite

Winemaking

To ensure the unique character of this sub region is exemplified in the wine, small open fermenters and our basket press were employed to gently extract the wine.

Aging in the finest quality new and seasoned French and American oak barrels for 18 months has created a wine that respects and expresses its place of origin.

Tasting Notes

TA:

Mineral notes, and fruit flavours of blackberry, Morello cherry. Notes of earth and cured meats bring the palate to a long and evenly weighted finish.

Deep crimson. Intense boysenberry, blackberry, mulberry aromas with espresso, roasted walnut notes. Well concentrated choco-berry fruits, plentiful fine lacy chalky/ al dente textures, underlying roasted chestnut, cola notes, attractive mid palate volume and integrated fresh acidity. Finishes claret-firm with persistent red liquorice, aniseed notes. Drinking well. Under cork. Drink now – 2026+

Dark, dense, concentrated purple/black colour with a powerful, super-ripe, jammy bouquet of crushed raspberry, mulberry and balsamic herbs. Dried sage and oregano. Very regional in style. Concentrated flavour, masses of mouth-coating tannins and a gripping farewell that last and lasts. A trace of bitterness in the tannins. A monster wine of power and persistence that begs to be cellared. And it's very Eden Valley—albeit in a big-boy style. 2023–2034

(...) pure, spicy and verging on fine (in the context of Barossa)... Eden Valley, in a nutshell, is cooler, higher elevation than the valley floor and offers finer acidity, blue fruits and shavings of meat and exotic spice. This is on the blue-fruited end of the spectrum and shows additional raspberry coulis, black salted licorice, deli meat and pie crust. The tannins frame the affair and make the whole thing quite moreish. Delicious. Well done.
