

GRAND BAROSSA GRENACHE SHIRAZ MOURVÈDRE 2024

Heritage

Château Tanunda, Icon of the Barossa was established in 1890 and is the site of some of the Valley's earliest vines as well as its first winery. The Château is privately owned by the Geber family who continue a tradition of fine wine making spanning three centuries.

Vineyard

For our Grand Barossa wines, we select grapes grown throughout the Barossa and its myriad of sub-regions. It is this tapestry of 'terroirs' which enables us to create our classic and refined house style.

Winemaking

Destemmed and fermented in separate parcels for 7 days with regular hand plunging. The individual varieties were matured 6 months in seasoned French and American oak before the final blend was crafted prior to bottling.

Tasting note

This exciting medium-bodied blend of Grenache, Shiraz and Mourvèdre displays ripe aromas of blackberry, black cherry, pomegranate, and raspberry followed by spicy, dark berry fruits and a hint of white pepper on the palate. The finish is long with fine grained tannins.

Awards

93 Points – Ken Gargett, Wine Pilot

A Barossa blend of Grenache (44%), Shiraz (38%) and Mourvèdre (18%), the wine spent six months maturing in a mixed of seasoned French and American oak. An attractive ruby maroon hue, the nose offers bright red cherries, spices and a hint of mulberries. Red fruits to the fore. Delightfully lifted aromatics, this is fresh and joyful. Decent length here, with good balance and fine tannins, this is quite delicious and will remain so for at least the next four to six years, likely longer. This is absolutely cracking value. A case or two of this in the cellar is wise buying, indeed.

93 Points – Sam Kim, Wine Orbit

Delightfully fruited and inviting, the bouquet shows Black Doris plum, raspberry, olive, clove, and toasted almond characters. It's beautifully rounded and expressive in the mouth, offering bright fruit flavours with fine tannins, making it immediately appealing and highly enjoyable. At its best: now to 2032.

92 Points – Ray Jordan, Wine Pilot

This is a thoroughly delicious blend that captures the famous style of the Barossa. It's medium-bodied but packs plenty of fruit intensity, revealing a black cherry and raspberry nuance with a lift of cracked pepper. It's more about fruit, so oak is subordinated. A wine that screams to be drunk in its exuberant early years. Cellar: 6 years.

91 Points – Campbell Mattinson

The fruit flavours here are more in the red fruit spectrum – think raspberry and even red cherry – than they are in the black, but it still feels generous and most importantly, it tastes delicious. Sweet spice, red licorice, hay and bright, mouthwatering raspberry flavours combine to put on a lovely, highly drinkable, show.
